As another year continues to fly by, clubs are now firmly in the midst of annual AGM's. I strongly encourage any member considering



December. The budget for the 2019 – 2020 financial year has been set, we are organising a session in October for the next strategic plan, the list goes on!


I have exhausted my word count and allocated space for this report – so watch out for Ellie's fortnightly updates and social media – they will keep you up to date with what is going on!




