### **AAFDA Conference - Orange, NSW**

The Association of Agricultural Field Days of Australasia Conference 2016 Report By Ebony McConnon.

#### Day one – Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> October:

Flew in to Sydney around lunch time, met Kate, Ethan and Karen at the airport and went to pick up the hire car. Drove the 266kms to Orange. Via Bathurst and the Mount Panorama Track!

Arrived in Orange by tea time – our hotel "Templers Mill" was just amazing, newly renovated hotel and very comfortable – nice and close to everything. Headed to tea at Hotel Canobolas, noticing flags on poles in the nature strip that ran the whole way down the main street! Then back to the hotel for an early night ready for a big day at the Australian National Field Days the next day.

#### Day two - Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> October:

We were up and ready to go on the bus at 9am, heading out to the Australian National Field Days for the day. What really stood out to us was the sponsorship signing on the sides of the main road as you drove in to the field days – eye catching and a great idea.

We spent the first 30 minutes in the field days gallery and had a nice morning tea with the rest of the conference delegates, before heading off for a wander around the field days for the rest of the day. There was a lot of industry grouping, round up was used for line marking sites, lots of permanent buildings/sheds/etc including their head office. Their roads were majority bitumen or compact gravel. Demonstration areas were set up around the outside of the site. Car parks were colour coordinated. They had an outdoor bar with a small stage where a young man playing acoustic guitar set up – really lovely atmosphere – I suggested to them to have ANFD stubby holders to sell.

The ANFD have about half as many exhibitors as Agfest, around 400, with about 18,000+ patrons over the 3 days of their event. We were then back on the bus that afternoon to head back to the hotel to get ready to head down to the newly built Orange Regional Gallery for a cocktail event. This was a great networking evening followed by a lovely meal at the Parkview Hotel with some fellow delegates.

#### Day three – Friday 21st October:

The day of the Conference, we had a meeting at the Orange Ex-Services Club at 9am, with around 40 delegates in the room. With a lot of reports, discussion and ideas from each field days representative, this was a real eye opener and a great morning spent working out how things are ran and working out the best way for field days to stay active in to the future.

A secretariat was assigned to help collate information immediately and to distribute this information to all field days to help keep things up to date and everyone informed of what happened at the Conference plus anything else that may come up between Conferences.

The date for the next AAFDA Conference will be held at the New Zealand Fieldays at Mystery Creek near Hamilton in NZ from Wednesday 13<sup>th</sup> June until Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> June 2018 – 20 months away. This will be their 50<sup>th</sup> Birthday, so huge celebrations to be had. We will hopefully be able to send a group of Agfest Field Days Committee Members along, I myself would love to attend as it sounds like an amazing Field Days!

The Conference wrapped up and we headed out to the Agrestic Grocer for a delicious lunch and more networking. We had a few hours free time so we headed out to Lucknow to the Skin Shop and Boot Barn – great shop where we could have spent a lot of money! Then back to the hotel ready for the bus again to head to tea at Highland Heritage Estate, a beautiful winery just on the outskirts of Orange. A great evening had; networking and socialising with the other conference delegates. Then back to the hotel for an early night ready to be up and at them, leaving the hotel at 6am the next morning to have Kate and Karen back ready for their flight – heading back to Tasmania for the Launceston Chamber of Commerce Business Awards that evening, where Agfest 2016 was a finalist in the Outstanding Event category. I stayed on in Sydney for a few extra days.

This trip was an amazing opportunity, and I thank Rural Youth Tasmania for giving me the chance to attend The Association of Agricultural Field Days of Australasia Conference in Orange, NSW. Another month gone during my exchange. I finished up in Colton, north of Sioux Falls and then my next host was a split hosting between parents and daughters families. First I spent 5 days in Sioux Falls having a look around and doing school things then it was two hours west to her parents place at Kimball.

In Sioux Falls I stayed with Jackie, Chris, Grace, Anna and John. I got to see the falls. The town is named after the Falls and at the moment they are running pretty well due to the couple inches of rain over the past week. There was also a tower that we could go up in to and look over the falls which gave it a great over view. Jackie and I then made a visit out to EROS, Earth Research Observations and Science. EROS have satellites flying around the earth about 400 miles up taking images all around the globe. The satellites do one lap of the earth every 16 days. There are mostly two satellites in orbit at once (for years at a time), so bringing back a new image therefore every eight days.

Of an evening the kids mostly had some kind of sport to go to, either soccer, cross country or horse riding, and of course there was homework which stretched my mind back to grade 8 science. I also went to Anna and John's classes and gave them a presentation of my life. The funniest questions were - can you ride a kangaroo? Do you name your cows? yes one, two, three, four - they got the gist that it was a no.

On Friday we all piled in the car after school and work and headed west to Kimball. We arrived about 7:30pm to meet Jackie's parents, Sheryn and Duane along with some other family. Sheryn had a home cooked meal all ready so we all fitted around the dining table - just, with 17 of us in total.

There were a lot of people at the farm this weekend as it was the opening weekend of pheasant season, which runs from the third Saturday in October until the 1st of January. There were lots of extended family there for the weekend and some other friends who come every year for pheasant season.

The next morning we all congregated in the shed and a couple of families had provided lunch for everyone so we all had something to eat and then headed out to start hunting at noon. A few blockers went to the end of the paddock to stand and shoot any birds that fly up. The rest of us spread out and started walking through the corn rows. A couple of birds would fly up and anyone could take a shot at it. But the catch was they are only allowed to shot roosters so if a hen fly's up 'hen' gets yelled out so that people don't shoot at it. We hunted various paddocks over the weekend and ended up with a total of 29 for the weekend. Mid afternoon Sunday everyone was packing up to go home and it was just back to the three households on the farm. Sheryn & Duane, Duane's brother John and his wife Jill and John's son Clay and family.

At the start of the week they were starting to do their harvest, starting with the soy beans, unfortunately the moisture was a little high so their cousin who owns half of the harvester had soy beans that were under moisture, so he used it for the week to get his out.

With not a lot else going on, Sheryn took the opportunity to take me to see a couple of local sights. We headed in to Mitchell to the worlds only Corn Palace to an Irish music concert. The Corn Palace is pretty amazing, using different varieties of corn and other plants to decorate the building inside and out. It costs \$130,000 to replace

the outside each year, but this year they were trialling to leave it for two years to see if it lasts and so reduce the large cost. We went back on Friday evening for the Corn Palace challenge - a rodeo which was held inside. The basketball court inside was totally transformed into an arena.

My last few days we headed down to Omaha, Nebraska to spend some time with Sheryn's other daughter Julie and family where I went to the library and swimming with her twins Luke and Lily. Jackie and family were also down there playing in a soccer tournament so I got to see the kids in action. Then it was on to the second half of my stay in South Dakota.



One year our debate team won the state comp and we went to the Adelaide Show to compete with the other States. On the serious side I took on active jobs in the Club such as Minutes Secretary, doing the Club Newsletter, Secretary, President and Northern Region Rep. From this experience I learnt how to manage a meeting, organise functions, arrange guest speakers for dinner meetings, things that maybe don't seem so special now but back then to me they were huge steps to building my confidence and skills that I draw on in my every day life now. One of my favourite years was 1990 when Sharon Symons (Wing) was our State President and Rural Youth owned a van. We travelled so many miles visiting other clubs meetings and functions and had the best fun. One year I spent a week of my work holidays out at Agfest parking cars and checking the toilets! It was so cold, wet and muddy trying to park the cars but it was the best week working with everyone and so rewarding. It still amazes me when I see the reports of Agfest each year and think how incredible it is that it is organised and run by young Rural Youthies who all volunteer their time. The many Rural Youth friends I have made are all life long buddies and even though I don't see a lot of them, we instantly pick up where we left off when we do catch up.

In April 1988, I went on a Northern Region Exchange with South Gippsland Young Farmers and had an awesome time meeting young rurals such as myself. I then was lucky enough to be chosen to go to Canada in 1989 on a 3 month exchange with the Ontario Junior Farmers. Wow! What an awesome time I will never forget. There was also 10 other exchanges from Ireland, Scotland, England and another Aussie from South Gippsland. I came home with lots of new friends from around the world. When I first joined Rural Youth I never even dreamed I would be brave enough to apply for these exchange trips let alone go around the world by myself, but little by little being part of such a fun, enthusiastic and encouraging organisation helps you to venture out and taken on bigger challenges. Even if things don't go as planned, you always learn something about yourself to make it better next time! I can't say enough about how being part of the Rural Youth Family has given me so many skills and attributes that I use every day.

I moved to Flinders Island 22 years ago with my husband Martin Walker who was a member of the Pipers River Club and yes another Rural Youth Marriage! We have a sheep and cattle property that we run along with our 4 children. Our 2 eldest girls Kate and Grace are working their way through their Uni courses, our son Tom is off to Newstead College next year and our youngest daughter Lucy will be in grade 9 here on Flinders. I was very involved in our Schools Parents & Friends Group ,the School Association, Netball and Football Clubs and our local Emita Hall Committee. I have helped organise many events which have raised \$1000s of dollars and each time I always think, there's my Rural Youth training coming to help me yet again! I was looking at the Rural Youth website the other day and saw that Rural Youth will be assisting with the Discover Agriculture Program which we have just had happen here on Flinders in September where Martin and I had the pleasure of meeting Ashley. Such an awesome program for young people and very exciting to hear that Rural Youth will be part of it

What would I say to someone thinking of joining Rural Youth! Just jump in and do it...you will have so much fun, make life long friends, achieve things you never thought possible and you will not regret a minute of it!

We wish each and every one a very Merry Christmas and a safe and happy New Year when we hope to have news of our next annual weekend reunion and industry tours.


