Over the 11 years as a Rural Youth member this organisation has provided me with so much. I have had the chance to meet new people, travel across Australia and the world and have learnt hands on practical skills that no other organisation could teach.

It is with this passion that I take on the role as State President. The 2017-18 Board achieved so much in its first 12 months and I want to see continued stability brought to this organisation. On Saturday September 15th, our new Board was voted in and I look forward to working with Jake Williams as Vice Chairman and the rest of the Board team to continue to improvement the Rural Youth brand.

Having been a member for quite a while it is evident that everybody takes something different from their memberships to RY. Our new Board team is committed to making every single members time in RY a positive one.

A big congratulations to outgoing State President Ashley Evans; you took over the role in a time when the organisation needed a driven individual to steer the ship and you have completed this to the highest degree.

The next few months in the Rural Youth calendar sees most of us becoming busy with our local shows. Our Discover Ag program will again be run in October, providing students in grades 9-12 valuable hands-on agricultural experiences and showing them the vast range of employment opportunities that the agricultural industry has to offer.

Keep your ears posted for other upcoming training opportunities as we finalise these for 2018.

Anyone visiting Quercus Park in the coming months is likely to see many tradies on the site. Works are soon starting on our \$600,000 wastewater upgrade as well as improvements to the Function Centre, Site Office and Ticket Booths. This expenditure will cost over \$800,000 but unlocks further development opportunities on the site.

On a personal note, I was lucky enough to visit the Royal Adelaide Show a few weeks back representing Tasmania in the National Rural Ambassador final. I made this final after representing Agfest in the State Finals. Whilst I did not win, the trip provided an invaluable networking opportunity and the chance to look at the attractions and manners in which other conduct their business. The Showgrounds themselves are extraordinary; the site is registered as a power plant on the South Australian Grid due to the bank of solar panels installed across the roofs of all buildings. They also have plans to build a hotel in the future to house the vast number of people that travel for the show. All investments made at the grounds must have a revenue stream for the remainder of the year when the show is not on. It was a great example of strategic expenditure and one that both Rural Youth and Agfest can learn a lot from.

I look forward to working hard for Rural Youth in the coming 12 months, feel free to give me a buzz to discuss anything that you would like to see improved within our organisation. Always remember that with Rural Youth, you only get out what you put in!!

EXCHANGE REPORT: NICOLE ELLIOTT - USA EXCHANGE

Good morning everyone,

Last time I wrote to you I was just at my final host family in Laramie, Wyoming. When I arrived at house the kids greeted me with a welcome sign, they had made it themselves!



Kym and her husband had just moved to Laramie from California which was a big change, but they were loving it and in the process of buying a house with some land so they could get some animals in the future. Kym is a social worker as well as a teacher in social work at the college.

On the first day the kids took me to the college and showed me around, we went to the dinosaur museum and had lunch with Kym on her break.


The University of Wyoming (UW) was established in 1886, with some of the original stone buildings still in use. The campus is really beautiful with stone buildings that are set in a circle with huge grass lawns in the middle. The college is quite active with their sports programs and has many fields, tracks and faculties to accommodate it.

On the Saturday we went to Medicine Bow National forest to watch the rock dancers. It is thought the UW dance program, a group of students and teaches dance and perform on rock faces, rock and lines hanging between to rocks, while they are attached to rock climbing ropes. It was something I had never seen before and they did an amazing job while hanging in the air!

After the dancing we went to a 150th anniversary lunch at the local park with a free lunch, kids activities and free line dancing lessons but the rain came in and dancing was cancelled. That evening we went to watch a college volleyball game.

It was a well attended match that had a small marching band and cheerleaders too! UW won and the kids got to go down and meet the players and get a signed poster! Sunday we jumped the border and drove 2 hours to Denver, Colorado to watch a professional baseball game, the Colorado Rockies vs St Louis Cardinals. The stadium was huge, with so much food, drink, cars, raffles, roof top bars and merchandise for sale around I think some people come for the atmosphere and not the game. The Rockies unfortunately did not win but was so glad to get the chance to go, it was on my wish list.

On Monday all the kids went back to work/school for the year, it was funny they start their school year in September but they get summer break like we do. So we were all up early Monday and walked to school, they live about a 3 minute walk to school. I had my days free during the week and filled it in with walking, going to the REC centre and would catch up with Kym for lunch a couple of times and meet up with Miles and Mikayla, my hosts from before. Laramie is a college town, so most people study, and work or have a business associated with the college.





EXCHANGE REPORT: NICOLE ELLIOTT - USA EXCHANGE

The following weekend was a big one for the town, first home football game of the season! It started with the kick off concert, Brothers Osbourne playing, which was a great night, so good live. Then Saturday morning I got ready in my UW color's and went to a tailgate party! From there we went to the game which started at 1.30pm. The stadium was close to full 20,000 people; all most the crowd was in yellow bar a very small section in red.

It was a crazy, fun, loud day and would love to go to another one. I did not understand all the rules but cheerleaders were there and the marching band came out at half time and did a great show. The game was close till half time but for then it went down hill for UW and they did not win. We did not leave till about 5 pm, so the games go for quite a few hours and all standing bar half time.

We drove back to Denver, Colorado to go the Denver Botanical Gardens. It was a lovely place almost in the heart of the city, with some beautiful buildings, flowers, different areas such as a Japanese garden and 'The Corpse Flower'! It only blooms every few years and when they bloom it's been quoted they smell 'like a corpse' which opened the day before I was there but not sure if I was glad or sad I missed it!

My time in beautiful Wyoming was almost over; just trying to pack everything and not be over weight with my luggage was tough but managed it! I might have spent up on M & M's which did not help my cause..

- -I got to stay with 5 lovely families that made me feel like part of there family.
- -Visited 6 of the 52 States; Wyoming, South Dakoda, Colorado, Idaho, Montana & Hawaii
- -Traveling between host families I did 1610miles (2591 km)

The people I meet, experiences I had and memories I made, I will not be for getting! (I have been in touch with some of my families since I have been home and will endeavor to keep the contact going)

If you're thinking about applying for a Rural Youth Study Tour, I would highly recommend that you do, it's a once in a life time opportunity! I was a little worried about being away for so long but it's a great way to

push yourself, learn a bit more about yourself and enjoy some international networking!

A <u>big thank you</u> to Rural Youth Tasmania and Betta Milk for this great opportunity.

I had someone away say to me — "why did you pick Wyoming out of all the states?" however it was a beautiful state and I am so grateful I got to explore it.

I hope that you have enjoyed reading my journey and if you get the chance to go to Wyoming, USA pop it on your list, I would happily talk your ear off about places to go and things to see.
