#### Looking forward, looking back: Feature focus on Past RY Members

My membership of RY commenced in 1977, after being invited to a Sorell RY dance at Tea Tree Hall where members from across the state attended. I quickly became a very active member, enthused by such a wonderful network of activity, friendship, challenge and excitement. Coming from a family farm, and working on a farm, this new wide world of engagement, completely consumed me, and took me on a journey of a lifetime. I held many offices within club, region, and state level. I was lucky enough to be awarded a 6 week exchange to the Orange Field Days in 1978, and 3 months to New Zealand in 1980, and travelled to most states of our country to meetings, conferences or functions with RY. These experiences changed me forever, and made me realise what a wonderful opportunity the RY network provided for young people, and how it must be kept alive and well at all costs.



Rural Youth underwent a massive challenge to survive in the early eighties, and I'm very proud to have been a small spoke in the wheel at that time of incredible change. I was State President in 1983, and also took over as Agfest Chairman, moving to Launceston for 3 months to our new office to coordinate the incredible expenditure of time and energy by dozens of great members, to bring about the first successful, "Statewide, Geographically Centrally Located, Annual Rural Trade Fair", Agfest! The success of this first event not only set the first foundation stone for Rural Youths ability to self fund, but it stimulated all sorts of activity, including the governments Agriculture Department, running a smaller, similar event at Cressy Research Station called "Agview", which only survived for a short period of time! The ongoing success of Agfest, made it very difficult for other events to succeed.

I held the office of Agfest committee chair for three years, (only equalled by Amanda Bayles recently!) and then site manager and toilet coordinator. It was said I had gone from the "Top Job, to the Bottom Job!!!) I was also honoured with a State Service Award and later, Life Membership, an honour I cherish dearly, and am today involved in anyway I can be useful, and am currently chair of the Advisory Committee.

The benefits provided by this great organisation, whilst not well known to those outside, must never be taken for granted or overlooked, and must be preserved for future members. Meeting procedure, understanding how meetings and committees work, and the opportunity to speak in front of your peers, and travel, are some of the most useful lessons and experiences to be gained from this fantastic organisation. Is there life after RY?? Most definitely! Many of the skills I learnt during my RY time have been put to good use in my working life, and with office bearing involvement with: School P&F, Coal River Products Association ( successful local farming group celebrating 50 years 2017) . Director on Board of TFGA for 3 three year terms, and currently a Board Member of Rural Alive and Well.

In summary, I have met my wife, made many life long friends, travelled extensively, had many fantastic experiences, received several honours, been part of the Agfest Success Story, and can still be involved, in the "Most Successful Youth Movement in Australia. All this, simply by being involved and grabbing the challenges with both hands.

#### USA

Hi all,

Since last month report I moved from Aledo, Western Illinois to Richmond, Northern Illinois about two hours north of Chicago and only five minutes from the Wisconsin border.

My time there was spent doing a lot more work. My host Natasha worked at Main Stay Therapeutic Farm which conducted horse lessons for people with disabilities and ran other programs for people with disabilities with smaller stock like miniature horses, miniature donkeys and sheep.



Natasha is a stable hand and had the responsibilities to feed the animals each morning and clean up all the poop from overnight. So while I was an extra there I couldn't really handle the animals, particularly the horses so I got pretty good at opening and shutting gates to bring them in for their morning feed.

Once they were all fed and sent back to their paddocks I was able to help clean the poop up that they had left in their night paddocks, got pretty good at it after a few days.

The Main Stay operation started 30 years ago and is still running strong today. It is fully funded by private donations and the riding lessons. Only 15% of the operational cost comes from the lessons, it's 85% which comes from private donations. I found this pretty amazing.

They employ about 20 people (mostly in a part time capacity) in the stables, to the office & administration and grounds men. The rest of the help comes from volunteers to assist with the riding lessons from grooming the horses to saddling up and then leading or side walking. In the last year their records show over 10,000 hours of volunteer work.

What started as a dream years ago, planning started 10 years ago and the fundraising and building part over the last four years, they have just moved in to a fantastic new facility upgrading from 10 inside stalls for 13 horses to now 20 stalls, four grooming areas, and a super large indoor all weather sand arena. Also they now have a massive tack room and everything has its own home rather than being piled on top of each other. It's definitely a one of a kind place and they have worked so hard to build it up to what it is today.

I did a couple of touristy things like visit Lake Geneva for a gentle paddle in a kayak, up to Pabst brewery and Great Lakes distillery in Milwaukee. Natasha's favourite place for a little relax time was to head to Etherial Chocolate where they made pretty good hot chocolate.

I am currently on my two weeks break between the two parts of exchange between states and have visited some friends from home and done some of my own touring. Next week I head over to South Dakota to continue with the remaining time of exchange - and it will start to get a tad cooler.



#### **GRAEME TOLE MEMORIAL AWARD 2016**

**G**raeme Tole was a wonderful asset to the Rural Youth Organisation of Tasmania, he joined Westmorland Rural Youth in 1962 at 16 years of age. He held the Presidency role of the club in 1965.

In 1966, he was declared President of Northern Region. He became involved in Rural Youth Council from 1968 and continued his involvement, ending up as State President of Rural Youth in 1971/72. This saw the starts of his connection with Advisory level.



In 1977, Graeme was presented a Life Membership of the Rural Youth Organisation of Tasmania. He held positions on the Property Management Committee from 1988 until 2004.

Unfortunately, in 2004, he was involved in a farming incident and passed away. During grieving his passing, the idea formed of a Graeme Tole Memorial Award Presidents Prize, in honour of this great leader, mentor and enthusiast of Rural Youth.

In 2009 this Memorial Award Prize was established, and the first recipient, Anthony Coad was announced.

This prize naturally is of a high standard, given the quality gentleman that it is honouring.

To have been considered for this prize, nominees had to meet the following criteria;

More than seven years of service to the Organisation.

A current financial Rural Youth member

Made continuous and notable contributions to all areas of the Organisation; Club, Region, State, Agfest, Property Management, and the Resource Allocation Committee (RAC).

Must have taken on roles on at least **four** of the following committees; Rural Youth Council, Agfest, Property Management, RAC, and their Club or Region Executive.

In 2016, there were four nominees for the Graeme Tole Memorial Award Presidents Prize.

Martin McConnon

Well done to all nominees, over the minimum of seven years of service, you have each bought something unique to the Organisation.

This award was presented at the Young Farmer of the Year Dinner, held at Quercus Park on Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> September 2016.

Congratulations to **Amanda Bayles** for being awarded the 2016 Graeme Tole Memorial Award President Prize.





The Rural Youth Exchange program is a unique opportunity to feel safe and "at home", even though you're hundreds or thousands of miles away – because you have a connection with your hosts and people you'll be associated with at the other end. They are affiliated to a like organisation and so you already have a bond. Add to that, having your own personal local guides and you get to see and experience much more than you would being an ordinary tourist and it's a lot cheaper because you're not paying for accommodation, although you will be expected to pitch in and help with the chores like any other member of the family.

Exchangees will also have a lifetime bond to other exchangees. Even though their experiences may be vastly different, in many ways they're the same and the prestige of being an Exchangee was and still is, a prestigious point in their Rural Youth career. Up until a few years ago, exchangees had their own Tasmanian Association, headed up by the returning UK exchangee and were able to get together for an annual function. Unfortunately, due to the Mad Cow Disease in the UK, this exchange ceased for a period of years and leadership of the Association lapsed.


There is still that primal need for like-minded people to have the means to re-connect and so in 2011 the Rural Youth Past Member's Association was formed. This is a streamlined version of the Tasmanian Exchangees Association where any past member of Junior Farmer or Rural Youth are eligible to join. It performs the same function of organising an annual function and only one meeting per year – the Annual Meeting. There is a small Executive of Convenor, Secretary and Treasurer, so very limited impost on members. There is a once only joining fee which covers you and your partner (at the same address) and no renewal.

If you're a past Exchangee, you are invited to join the Rural Youth Past Member's Association.
