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Study Tour Report Owen Woolley Canada

Hello All

I hope the winter back home is being nice to you all, the weather here is quite enjoyable at the moment averaging 30 degrees of a day and a thunderstorm of an evening due the humidity of a day. Things in Canada have been very busy, finding the time to sleep and write reports has been rather difficult.

Over the past 6 weeks I have seen many different farming operations from dairies through to cash cropping enterprises, the scale of the operations is hard to believe. Nearly everywhere you look ground has been worked to plant crops consisting of corn, soy beans and wheat. Predominantly farmers store everything in silos or bunkers for their own use on the farm.

Another highly popular method is growing to supply local co-ops, our equivalent of Roberts or Elders. Co-ops then store the product and sell back to farmers who don't have the ability to grow their own feed or don't have enough storage for their requirements. The other option for those that do have the room to store larger quantities of product, they have the possibility to supply feed mills or grain elevators. The farmer will harvest and dry the product down to 15% moisture content then store in silos, or depending on their contractor, cart the product straight to port for shipping. If they are to supply a feed mill, the mill will tell them how many tons they require and when, the farmer will then have the feed picked up or transport it there themselves. Once at the mill it is mixed with other products to produce the feed for which ever industry they supply, whether it be pigs, chickens, turkeys, dairy or cattle.

The biggest tour we have been on so far was to Stantons Brothers Dairy, a 2,500 head operation, milking 750 head in a double 36 parlour, milking 3 times a day. They produce 25,000 litres of milk a day, with a holding capacity of 65,000 litres on site and room to install another 32,500 litre tank in preparation for further expansion. The dairy has the ability to hold up to 4,000 head, consisting of five cow and heifer barns, one barn for the milking parlour and another barn for calves. As well as running a successful dairy, the Stantons have one of the biggest and most trusted names for semen and breading cows in North America and across the globe. With four cows and their heifers in the herd being rated as number one and two for Holstein cattle in the world, those heifers have an average price tag of around \$400,000 purely for the genomics and breading figures.

Study Tour Report Owen Woolley Canada Continued..

When planning the barns, (the new barns were built in 2010), the owners invested a lot of time and effort in trying to get them as energy efficient and environmentally friendly as possible. All the waste from the barn goes into enclosed storage tanks where the methane gas is collected, stored and burnt running a turbine and producing power to be used in the barns. Once the waste slurry has settled in the slurry tanks, it is then cleaned and filtered, then used up to 8 times to wash the barn and parlour. The solid waste material that is separated from the water waste, is washed and dried with the drier powered by methane gas from the storage pit. Once the solids are clean and dry, they are used in the barns for bedding for the cattle. Experiments are being undertaken at the moment on their slurry tanks, trying to get a microalgae growing on the top of the tank. At a certain stage the algae will be scrapped off, and during this process it produces CO2 gas which is burnt in the gas turbine, again producing power for the barn. Once the algae is harvested, some process takes place and converts the algae into oil, which is used on the farm in bio-diesel for tractors and so on. Hexane gas is produced from the distillation produce of the algae which is then collected and sold on to distributors.

That is a bit it from Canada for the time being, I am currently on my way to Ottawa to start my trip back towards Toronto after going fro the America border, all the way up to Tobermory, Sunridge and all the way down to Niagara Falls. Until next time.....



Study Tour Report Melinda Hyland United Kingdom

Hi everyone,

I have just finished reading through 'The Scottish Farmer' as grey clouds pass through the sky above and moisture begins to fall down. I am now in the middle of my third week in the United Kingdom. Time is flying by!

After flying into Birmingham, England I spent my first week in the county of Staffordshire. This is where Katie Pollock was from. My host lived by herself in a small village. As she was working for most of the week, I spent time with different club members exploring the county. This included walking through Trentham Gardens (an Italian inspired garden), decorating my own plate at the Emma Bridgewater pottery factory, spending time at the Young Farmer county office and visiting the smallest pub in Staffordshire which is owned by the family of a Young Farmer member. The pub was literally the size of a small lounge room and was filled with locals. My time in Staffordshire also included a day at Rockingham Castle in Leicestershire at the AGM for the County Land and Business Association (my host's employer). Local lords and ladies and farmers dressed in tweed and wellies attended the day to hear and share views of the county, have a 2 course meal followed by a tour of the castle and estate. The Staffordshire show was also on during my week here. This was like AGFEST on a much smaller scale and included cattle and sheep showing, horse jumping and a clydesdale parade. Young Farmer clubs from the county all entered in the annual float competition which were decorated to the theme of board games. This parade of floats is viewed quite high from the general public with some patrons commenting they only come to the show to see the Young Farmers floats and their water fight. The water fight takes place in the main show ring and begins after a key word has been used in the announcer's speech. Buckets upon buckets of water were tipped over participants which amused patrons immensely.

My second week in the U.K. was spent in Yorkshire, England. I stayed with a family on a small dairy farm which milked 60 very quiet cows. The week started off on a social note with 'Wetter the Better'. This involved many water relays and events and getting as wet as possible. Other social events included a car treasure hunt, a Young Farmer barbeque and a country supply stores community birthday. I also visited the Wensleydale cheese factory (the same cheese mentioned in Wallace and Gromit). Even though I did not grow up on a dairy farm, I found it interesting when we visited a dairy that used two milking robots. The robots run continually and it was up to the individual cow when she wanted to get milked. Some cows can be milked up to 5 times in a 24 hour period. The farmer however has a system in place to make sure no cows are left unmilked.

Study Tour Report Melinda Hyland United Kingdom Continued ...

I left Yorkshire on the train and headed to Edinburgh, Scotland. It was here I met the other 10 exchangees. We all stayed in a backpackers for 3 nights. Our days in Edinburgh were seen as a bonding time as we got to know each other. We attended a dinner that welcomed us to Scotland and were joined by different chair people from a range of rural sectors, Young Farmer committee members and past and current Scottish exchangees. It was a fantastic dinner followed by entertainment in the form of listening to accordion music and learning traditional Scottish dances. A great night was enjoyed by all.

This week all the exchangees have been with their host families however we have been involved in group activities daily. Activities have included club barbeques, dodge ball competition and dance, collecting money in the parade for Linamar's and visiting an old cotton mill. The clubs have been very busy this week working on their entries for the Royal Highland Show which will be held at the end of the week. I am looking forward to this. All the exchangee's have received a map and visited the site last week, getting a feel for the size of the show. It will be interesting to see how it compares to AGFEST.

Good luck to all of you who are applying to go on exchange next year!
