PROPERTY MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

The Property Management Committee was placed into a 12 month recess on August 21. This decision was made after careful consideration and was based on the belief that many of the components required to 'manage' Property Management, particularly in time and expertise, had gone beyond what could be asked of a volunteer.

The coming 12 months will see us trial a 'new' structure, with the office staff dealing with administration in conjunction with a part time Caretaker who will be onsite 3 days a week. Members can still make suggestions/ask questions or raise concerns via email or phone to Head Office or through a suggestion box which will be installed on site at Quercus in the next few weeks. The Resource Allocation Committee will retain overarching responsibility for Property Management and Head Office will be the first point of contact.

Members are encouraged to participate in working bees – it is anticipated that there will be scope for more 'project' based work given that much of the day to day maintenance will be completed outside of working bees.

As this is the first time the Property Management Committee has been put into recess and we have had a paid staff member on site there will no doubt be some teething problems as we get processes put in place, so I would ask for your patience during this 'settling in' period.

This decision will be reviewed in 12 months' time and the role of the Property Management Committee will again be considered.

Top Teams 2015

In taking on Top Teams Coordinator I had no idea what was involved however I am pleased to say that it was a breeze to organise and went smoothly on the day.

Congratulations to all teams who competed on the day. Unfortunately I only had four teams enter which was disappointing to see, I would of liked to see a team from each club however we had a ball. I hope all competitors enjoyed the day and will go back to your club meetings with some positive feedback and encourage new and more teams next year.

This year I had a team from Kingborough Huon "The Mighty Midgets", a team from Dorset mixed team "Quercus Quadz", a team from Central Highlands "The Highland Hotties" and a team from North Motton "North Motton". Each team had to complete nine twenty minute challenges. This year I tried to in a way to mimic Young Farmer modules by introducing a first aid challenge where I had judges give each team a different scenario based on things that could happen on the farm and allowed extra bonus points for CPR and mouth to mouth, this seemed to be really successful and each team was surprisingly focused.

The other challenges were a muffin decoration challenge, a relay race, a building challenge where each team was given a packet of pasta and a packet of small marshmallows and had to make a tower to hold a 90 gram tin of tuna, a general knowledge quiz, a scavenger hunt, a cloth making challenge and a ten pin bowling challenge. Trying to keep in theme with Young Farmer I tried to incorporate some public speaking I had told each team they needed to come up with a chant or song about their region or club and they were all a bit hesitant about it but all performed the songs in front of all competitors and judges and I must say each team did really well in this section.

I would like to thank my assistant Emma White, without your help this wouldn't have been possible as I work full time Emma done a lot behind the scenes to help me out. Amanda Bayles for all your help and assistance on the day and all the girls at Head Office for my phone calls and all of your help. I really do appreciate it.

Australian Chainsaw Products, Young Farmer of the Year Competition

Back in July the Young Farmer of the Year Competition started with the Regional Run offs. From here the 24 participants was brought back to 15 finalists. Next step was to organise the State Competition which was held at Quercus on the 12th of September.

For me this was the fun and challenging part, contacting past members to request help on the day, organising shirts and bringing it all together for the 12th of September.

To start off the day after a morning greet we headed down to the Bracknell Gun Club who hosted the first module which was target shooting. Finalists were required to shoot five shots standing and five shots sitting.

Finalists then returned back to site and went off with their time table and completed the modules as follows. They had some time with Ian Mackenzie's sheep with Lance Bailey running this crutching module where they were required to assemble a hand piece and crutch a sheep.

On the 4wd track Colin Berne was situated with an ATV where finalists were required to identify parts and safely operate an ATV.

With water being such an important resource for us knowing about it was put in a test to see how much finalists knew about it and how much needs to be applied to crops. Thanks to David Armstrong for compiling the module and Rob Bayles for running on the day.

For a part of the day to let your hair down was to complete a challenge which was to sew a bag with a bag sewer then stack 20 bags on to a pallet, then hook the bus on to the trailer and load the pallet on to the trailer, tie on securely and drive around the block. On return they were to reverse park the trailer back in to position and do the reverse by unloading the trailer, bags and un-sew the bag. To put an extra challenge on the end was to milk the cow, kindly provided by the Longford Show, with thanks to Michael Gordon for running this module.

Finalists then made their way in to the kitchen where they were required to cook eggs three different ways including hard boiled, fried and poached with thanks to Laura Richardson for running this module.

To keep the stock in was to try your hand at fencing with Heath Dobson straining up wire and tying a few different knots.

There was a finance module to see if you were able to add up your sums, provided and run by Sam Dobson.

To keep up to date and learn regarding the animal welfare module was Lyndon Iles who from his job was able to present a number of scenarios for finalists to ponder.

The last module for the day time was a whole farm planning module by Nikki Atkins where competitors tried their hand at paperwork and getting their hands dirty comparing soil.

At the end of the day all scores were added together to give the top six finalists who were Martin McConnon, Mikey Pearson, Peter Damen, Richard Petrie, Tobias tenBensel and Will McConnon. It was turning out to be a very close competition with only 65 points separating the six competitors.

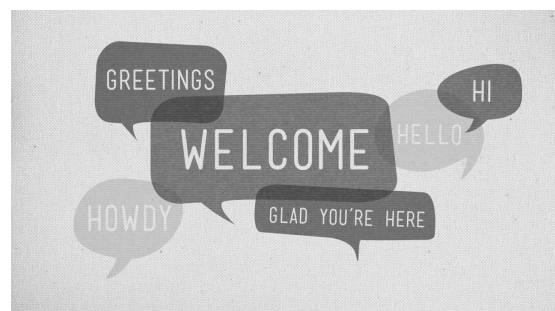
