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
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Organisational Overview

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 2013

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial report is a special purpose report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the *Associations Incorporations Act (Tas)*. The State Council has determined that the organisation is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act (Tas) and the following Australian Accounting Standards:

AASB 1031

Materiality

AASB 110

Events After the Balance Sheet Date

No other applicable Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views of other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values, or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following material accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

(a) INVENTORIES

Stock on hand is valued at the lower of either cost or net realisable value.

(b) PROPERTY, PLANT & EQUIPMENT

Freehold land comprising the Quercus property and 62 York Street, Launceston were independently revalued in November 1999. The basis of the valuation of the land and improvements was market value for mortgage security purposes. The valuation was carried out by Andrew Cubbins F.V.L.E. (Val) Dip. Val., a registered valuer for Harrison Humphreys Pty Ltd.

The market value of the Quercus property of \$450,000 includes only those improvements existing at the time of the valuation.

Subsequent to the abovementioned valuation the Organisation initiated a significant site improvement program which included expenditure, to date, totaling \$792,078 on the construction of a Meeting Hall and several Sheds at Quercus Park. The outlays in respect of these buildings have been capitalised and are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation.

Plant and equipment are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation.

The carrying amount of all property, plant & equipment is reviewed annually by the Organisation to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount for those assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows which will be received for the assets' employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to present values in determining recoverable amounts.

Depreciation

No depreciation is recorded in respect of the York Street building. The depreciable amount of the meeting hall and sheds erected on the Quercus property is depreciated on a straight line basis over the useful lives of the buildings to the Organisation. The depreciation rate of 2.5% is used. The depreciated amount of all plant and equipment is depreciated on a straight line basis over the useful lives of the assets to the Organisation commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. The rate of 20% is used for all plant and equipment.

(c) CONSOLIDATION OF ACCOUNTS

Under the Organisation's constitution, individual Rural Youth clubs form part of the structure of the Rural Youth Organisation of Tasmania Incorporated, and as such the assets and liabilities of these clubs are assets and liabilities of the Organisation. Similarly, club transactions are also those of the incorporated body.

The committee considers the cost of consolidating these amounts into the financial statements of the organisation exceed the benefits of doing so.

(d) INCOME TAX

The net surplus of the Organisation is exempt from income tax under Section 50-40 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act, 1997*. Accordingly, no provision for income tax or income tax expense appears in the accounts.

(e) SITE IMPROVEMENTS

All expenditure incurred during the year is reported as an expense in the "property management" statement of financial performance.

(f) EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

Provision is made in respect of the Organisation's liability for employee entitlements arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. All entitlements have been measured at their nominal amount. Long service is accrued in respect of employees with more than 7 years service.

Contributions are made by the Organisation to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

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Executive Officer

2013 has been both an interesting and challenging year for the Rural Youth Organisation of Tasmania. There was a general acceptance amongst the members that, whilst many components of the organisation were working, there were some quarters, which were not going so well, and it was time to employ a full time Executive Officer to work ON the business.

I commenced in September 2013 with a change in career direction from the past 15 years as a self-employed business consultant. I bring to the position consulting and board experiences from both private enterprises and not-for-profit organisations. I am a member of the Institute of Public Accountants and the Australian Institute of Company Directors. My experiences are supported by a Master's in Business Administration, a Diploma in Corporate Governance, a Cert IV



in Training and completion of the Tasmanian Leadership Program in 2010. I commenced my board career in the 1980s and have held several NFP directorships – currently I am a board member of Tasmanian Leaders Incorporated.

Firstly, I would like to express my gratitude for inheriting excellent staff and acknowledge their invaluable support whilst I have been 'finding my feet' particularly Judy's knowledge from 32 years in the organisation.

Our key strength is, without doubt, our dedicated members who often go beyond what could reasonably be expected. This resource is invaluable and above all else must be supported and developed. We need to enable constructive changes to engage club members to the organisational purpose, enhance professional development and industry opportunities with marketing to lift the public awareness of Rural Youth. Whilst Agfest takes a lot of time and gives those involved a strong sense of purpose, it needs to be viewed as the tool, which enables the organisational purpose, not the organisational purpose itself. Therefore, my key focus in the next twelve months is to assess whether the organisation (as a whole), members, clubs, committees, organised events, and organisational culture are not only achieving our purposes but are aligned to the underlying fundamental values of the organisation. A component of this is adherence to the Work Health & Safety Act 2012.

We have commenced working on an overall risk register which, when completed, will encompass identification and assessment of risks in clubs, administration and events.

At the time of writing this report the financial audit has not been completed but I can confirm we have a positive cash flow from the 2013 year and in March we will be adding to the Special Investment Term Deposit. This special investment was setup in 2012 and has a current balance of \$65,000. The aim of this account is to build enough funds through the next few years where the principal amount continues to build with 75% of the interest moved into a 'projects fund'. The committees are then able to apply for projects/events to be funded from the interest. Thus retaining the principal amount to provide sustainable financial security for the organisation.

In October 2013 the Resource Allocation Committee agreed to fund four programs to assist in defining the desired brand, values and culture and enable the development of short and long-term organisational strategies, which are underpinned by systems, policies and procedures. We commenced with a Brand Discovery workshop for Rural Youth Committee Executives, conducted by Rick Marton from Effective Naturally. We have developed a twelve-month roadmap to refine our brand, understand our focus, identify who our target market is for membership, identify barriers within the culture and create solutions.

At the same time Volunteer Tasmania are conducting a Volunteer Management Review. The review was to ascertain how Rural Youth managed their volunteers against the eight National Volunteer Standards. As I write this report, I am expecting the draft report to arrive. Once finalised, the survey results will be sent to all members. We will also be will be conducting a one day Team Building workshop conducted by Tony Barker of Moving Mind Mountains, to assist committee members with the understanding of team dynamics and people management.

The fourth component is a strategic planning *Future Vision Brainstorming* session facilitated by Rick Marton on Saturday 15th February. A strategic plan will provide us with a clear roadmap for the next few years. Allowing us to develop both the organisation and our members; delivering greater value to our industries, adapting our systems and processes to meet the desired outcomes and making strategic investments to position Rural Youth for the future. Our past members had the foresight to setup Agfest, purchase Quercus Rural Youth Park and York Street. Whilst this provides us with a financially stable short term operational environment it all presents as high risk with over 90% of our income earned from 3 days of the year. The aim of the brainstorming session is to gather the member's thoughts on the long-term future direction of Rural Youth, particularly around Quercus Rural Youth Park, other income streams, membership engagement, development and growth.

In February our State President, Simone Hayers, will be providing the members with a Rural Youth Re-structuring briefing paper and will call for a vote on the intent to re-structure at the March 2014 AGM. If this is accepted, regional workshops will be conducted to discuss more specific details before the drafting of a new Constitution and charters for the proposed Committees. If the re-structuring is then passed by the members it will be developed, along with the information gathered from the brainstorming workshop, into a longer term strategic plan which would encapsulate:

- The new structure
- The short term goals (> 12 month)
- The visionary long term goals (3, 5 and possibly 10 years) including long term plans for Quercus Rural Youth Park
- A marketing strategy
- A projected business plan (finances) to support the above short and long term goals
- Key performance indicators (what will success look like?)
- Action plans (who will do what? when, how and where?)

As we head into 2014, we will be working with the members to understand what makes us different, how we are all going to make the world a better place and we'll be telling the world about Rural Youth heroes. We will be building our club memberships, all singing from the same songbook, and delivering our core messages of:

- Relationships for Life meet new people that will build a handy network for the future without having to have a specific skill set or background to be welcomed into the club.
- Learning with Rewards the chance to learn practical skills at your own pace and win rewards for your efforts.
- Building a Track Record gain the experience you need to make your resume look solid with professional roles available such as Media Liaison, Treasurer or Project manager with significant budgets.
- Travelling the World Study tours that give you the chance to immerse yourself in another culture.



Resource Allocation Committee

The Committee met regularly (bi-monthly) in 2013 and had a challenging but ultimately rewarding year.

A large number of items and issues were dealt with by the committee over the 12 months including budget vs. actual reviews, wet Agfest costing's, OH&S issues, in kind sponsorship policy, capital expenditures, purchasing policy and tender process, disability review, HR matters, anti-discrimination case, budget process, policy and procedures reviews and implementations, administration Review (in progress but due to some procedural issues, aborted in May).

There were changes in the committee in May with the retirement of Michael Gordon after completing his 3-year term, replaced by Jayne Clark. The chair position also changed with David Dunn retiring to be replaced by Elizabeth Skirving.

We thank Michael for his strategic vision and in depth analysis whilst on the committee. David remains on the committee and must be recognised for his time and commitment during his various terms as Chair.

Jayne Clark was welcomed to commence her three-year term and was thrust into the role overseeing a process to appoint an Executive Officer for the organisation. Shona Beswick commenced in the position in September 2013.

In the latter half of the year, RAC has supported Rural Youth Council and State President, Simone Hayer's direction to review the organisation through a 4 step process (communication and branding, team building, volunteering and strategic vision).

Changes in the running of the RAC committee to implement greater policy and procedure and governance guidelines have been supported but has added to many changes being implemented – including review of all activities by the Executive Officer, changes in office staff, more rigorous reporting requirements for finance to RAC and greater accountability for decision making.

I must thank all committee members for their support and understanding in a changing environment. The passion of these members who lead the organisation when juggling the demands of home life, work and committee roles whilst undertaking such major review and change at an executive level is admirable.

RAC still has much to accomplish and will continue to undertake its role of overseeing the HR and asset management of the organisation whilst supporting the operating arms.

There were the announcements about Simplot's uncertain future as a vegetable processor in Tasmania, an unseasonal wet spring and the state's moratorium on genetically modified crops was reviewed. Nationally, live export continued to cause debate and large areas of Queensland and New South Wales were drought declared. Much, much more went on throughout 2013 and, as agriculture is known to be, it was all incredibly diverse and dynamic.

My aim whilst in this role was to provide you with information about different sectors and about current issues affecting the agricultural industry. Most of this occurred through newsletter articles, which I hope you found interesting. If there were a topic you would like to know more about then the agricultural director is a great point of contact and do not hesitate about getting in touch with them to find out more.



I also started work on planning some farm visits, but did not manage to run them during 2013. I hope that the 2014 director can continue on with these plans and provide opportunity for members to take part in some trips to various farming operations and processing plants.




The graphs that are presented are based on information that is completed by members from the membership card that is completed each year. The data shows history of the Organisation from 1997 through to 2013.


The graph below shows that membership numbers have been steadily declining since around 2004, something that Rural Youth Council is aware of and is currently being worked upon as part of a bigger picture look at the Organisation.



The second graph (below) shows the break down in our members based on gender. In the last three years there have been slightly more male members compared with female members; however history shows data going back to 1997 that there has generally been a lot more male members in the Organisation compared with females.

The third graph shows the breakdown of Rural Youth members that live on or off the farm. The data shows that members living on farms has decreased (dotted blue line) compared with members that don't live on a farm, which has remained consistent.








This graph shows Brighton Rural Youth, Circular Head Rural Youth and Devonport Rural Youth Clubs.




This graph shows Dorset Rural Youth, Hagley Rural Youth and Isolated Members.



This graph shows Kingborough Huon Rural Youth, North Esk Rural Youth and North Motton Rural Youth Clubs.




This graph shows Northern Midlands Rural Youth (no longer operating), Oatlands Rural Youth and Sisters Creek Rural Youth Clubs.


This graph shows Sorell Rural Youth, Tamar/Launceston Rural Youth and Tasman Rural Youth Clubs.


The next big task for me was to compile this annual report, which was very daunting to begin with, but once I had a cover page and some headers and footers in place the whole project seemed to flow nicely.





Rural Business Tasmania

Our new name, Rural Business Tasmania Inc., was adopted in late 2012 re-positioning the organisation for future rural business opportunities.

Rural Business Tasmania Inc. has valuable relationships with the Department of Agriculture Fisheries and Forestry [Federal Government], Department of Primary Industries, Parks, Water and Environment [State Government], Rural Youth Organisation of Tasmania, Tasmanian Farmers and Graziers Association and Royal Agricultural Society of Tasmania. We acknowledge the contribution, through grant funding, subsidised rental premises, and administrative support enabling the service to meet the demands of the rural community whilst operating on limited funds


CORE SERVICE - RURAL FINANCIAL COUNSELLING SERVICE TASMANIA

Rural Financial Counselling Service Tasmania, whilst operating under tight budget and funding constraints, continued to experience growth in client need. This increase of 34%, servicing 219*1 clients, was a high workload for just 2.2 FTE Rural Financial Counsellors, who dealt with complex, time intensive case management loads.

We had increased number of clients seeking assistance to negotiate with their financiers to avoid the threat of formal collective action. In many cases, the collection process is well advanced by the

time we are engaged. We are able to assist clients to either seek a suitable refinance package where long term viability can be demonstrated, or in the case of need to exit, negotiate extended timeframes to allow clients to attempt to sell assets on their own terms. It has been difficult to achieve sale of agricultural land due to depressed market conditions, with many properties going to auction and not receiving a bid or offer. Generally, we have been able to negotiate with financiers to allow voluntary exit without mortgagee possession.

There has been ongoing demand around partnership and succession planning issues. This has involved coordination with solicitors and accountants, Centrelink (e.g. eligibility for

Age Pension) and provisions relating to intergenerational transfer of farm properties.

Assistance requests for Business Planning remain constant with clients often only presenting for upon decline for additional funding from their Bankers. This presents the opportunity to review all aspects of their business by utilisation of the Enterprise Action Plan (EAP) process.

The devastating bushfires in South Eastern Tasmania in January 2013 impacted on the community with many new and existing clients requesting assistance to apply for the various government and other grants.

Client outcomes continue to be varied with some farmers adopting exit strategies and others adjusting within primary production with either improved financial and operational skills, diversification and off farm employment. Our involvement has resulted in clients being better off financially, emotionally, or simply better informed.

The Federal Government announced that additional funding from July 2013 through to June 2015, increasing rural financial counsellor staff to 3.8 FTE

BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

Discussions with government at State and Federal level undertaken for possible opportunities for the organisation including development of the National Drought Platform and State Budget submissions. Development and presentation of board briefing papers was undertaken for business growth opportunities and to date business plans have been developed:

PROFESSIONAL SERVICES

- Rural Business Coaching model developed for Business and Small Business Advisory services, brief
 provided to state and federal government members incl. Mr Sid Sidebottom, MP and Senator
 Richard Colbeck for consideration in future government policy developments
- Training opportunities explored e.g. with RuralBiz Training collaborative approach to improving farm business skills in target group.

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

- E.g. Fee for Service or commercial partnership arrangements
- Launch of book keeping services. This has included canvassing potential client and referral points
- Secretariat support under auspicing arrangements with Rural Help @ Hand

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Enhancing Rural Business Decisions Pilot – The Virtual Coach

 Developed in consultation with Tas Government's DPIPWE, Tasmanian Institute of Agriculture and Skills Institute/TasTafe. Funding for this pilot is sourced through Skills Tasmania

GIFTING FUND

The Gifting Fund, established to assist Tasmanian rural families and communities in times of need, provides an avenue for tax deductible donations from the community which are allocated on an as needs basis when required, either for individual clients or for a project identified by the Committee.

The gifting fund has opportunity for further growth and development. This year we have had a record level of donations, with significant donations from private citizens resulting from the devastating Tasmanian bushfires. We are positioning the gifting fund as the charity of choice for those who wish to support rural Tasmania. We express our thanks to Tasmanian Rural Youth for their \$5,000 cornerstone cash donation to the Gifting Fund. A partnership arrangement was formalised in early 2013 with Rural Youth Organisation of Tasmania Inc.

MARKETING

Meetings with various department and parliamentary representatives throughout the year, including meeting with Senator the Hon. Joe Ludwig, then Federal Minister for Agriculture through Community Cabinet held in Launceston, Mr Sid Sidebottom MP, Parliamentary Secretary to Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry and Senator Richard Colbeck, Senator for Tasmania, Shadow Parliamentary Secretary for Fisheries and Forestry. At a state level we met with Deputy Premier Bryan Green Minister for Primary Industries.

Attendance at two National Rural Financial Counselling Provider forums also gave an opportunity for the interests of Tasmanian rural community issues to be presented and allowed discussion on the future policy directions of government.

Profile raising opportunities were achieved including:

- Increased profile and engagement with Department of Economic Development's small business section, appointment of allocated contact person and interaction with David O'Byrne, Minister for Economic Development.
- Commenced pathways to interaction with University of Tasmania departments
- Recognition as provider under the Tasmanian Premiers community support program, Active Partners. This was established as a result of January 2013 bushfire response.
- Membership of Tasmanian Small Business Council and attendance at events
- Partnership with 26Ten (Tasmanian Adult Literacy program)
- CEO was member of Bushfire Social Recovery Reference Group

Our Stakeholder forums provided a valuable opportunity to hear from a variety of representatives from likeminded organisations, industry and/or community members of rural and regional Tasmania. This conduit assists greatly in ensuring referrals for our service assist our clientele. It also allows understanding of the emerging and current issues being experienced.

We again had a prominent trade display at the annual "Agfest" field days in May. The theme of the site was twofold with wellbeing and business areas co-habiting a large site with two 5X10m marquees in an L-shape. Thanks to Rural Youth for their support in providing this site.

STRUCTURE

Changes to the Constitution were approved at the 2012 Annual General Meeting.
