CHARITY OF CHOICE ANNOUNCEMENT

The Agfest Committee selected Ronald McDonald House, Hobart, as this year's official Agfest Charity of Choice! We are providing Ronald McDonald House their site and allocation of complimentary passes, the brand alignment as Agfest Official Charity, and a donation from the ATM fees charged throughout the event.

The service that Ronald McDonald House offers during the most difficult and challenging times, when their child is facing chronic illness or serious injury is a godsend to these families. At a time when the families life is turned upside down, Ronald McDonald House is there to help, providing accommodation at little or no cost.

At the end of an emergency flight or a long and arduous road journey, Ronald McDonald House offers a warm welcome, a cuppa and 24 hour assistance. The House becomes a home for families to stay together, at a time of difficulty.

Ronald McDonald House Charities were first established in Philadelphia, U.S, 1974, a journey which began with just one families experience when their 3 year old child developed leukaemia. RMHC has now grown to be a global charity with 358 Ronald McDonald Houses in 42 countries.

Australia was the first country outside the U.S. to establish a Ronald McDonald House. RMH Hobart opened in September 1998 and has since supported more than 5,600 families.

There are many reasons that families need to stay at Ronald McDonald House. Families of premature babies make up the largest percentage, along with families of children with chronic and life-threatening conditions, such as children requiring surgery, accident/trauma victims and mothers with high-risk pregnancies.

The House operates 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and provides all the comforts of home. Families can cook meals and do their laundry, similar to their own home. The rooftop garden provides a welcome break for a coffee in the sun or for children to ride a bike or run and climb. This helps to maintain normal routines, which often provides a welcome distraction from the stress of caring for a seriously ill child. Families gain strength from other families staying in the House who may be on a similar journey and they often form long-lasting friendships.

Ronald McDonald House is a non government funded charity, therefore support from the community is vital in helping it maintain its life-sustaining service to rural and regional Tasmanian families.

I was fortunate enough to meet with Penny Richardson, who is the Executive Assistant of Ronald McDonald House Hobart. I was fortunate enough for Penny to show me around the House and see all that it provides to the families.

Agfest extended the opportunity for a charity to become a part of our family and in turn, we are now part of the Ronald McDonald House family.

Stay tuned for some exciting plans in supporting Ronald McDonald House, and maximising the opportunity behind their presence at our event, as well as during the lead up and pack up period.

AGFEST SUPPORTS RURAL YOUTH CLUBS & REGIONS

Way back during our Brainstorming Weekend, we tabled the idea to get behind our clubs and regions to help with their fundraising! Each year, Agfest allocates a "family pass" to each club to do what they please with it. 
Next month I will include a list of which clubs and regions are fundraising along with a contact for each club. If you wish to purchase your tickets from a particular club – you can!

Policy Speech

Rural Youth is offering subsidies for short courses to any financial member.


