The 2016/17 Organising Committee are full steam ahead in planning and preparation. With much thought into what the 2017 event will deliver to patrons, exhibitors and outcomes.

At time of reporting, all committee positions are now filled – stay tuned for the announcement of new committee members in next months newsletter - please if you are interested in a specific area let us know and we will ensure you are communicated within this years plans in method of succession planning in hope you can step up when ready to take that next level on within your Rural Youth career.

With the November the 11th budget deadline fast approaching, we are chasing final quotes ready to submit to RAC for consideration.

As a committee we are looking at methods in improving functionality as far as communication and dealings internally, providing the education in the importance of submitting rsvp to meetings, reading meeting documentation and submitting reports and/or communicating within your directorship to ensure transparency, communication and committee backing/support.

Sponsorship engagement is about to commence with the release of the revised Agfest sponsorship prospectus.

Chairman Report presented at the AAFDA Conference—Orange 2016

The success of Agfest 2016 – with many challenges and work achieved, the Organising Committee managed to deliver to the 58,285 patrons what was reported as a great event, well-structured and interesting by many.

With 126 Rural Youth Volunteers and a team of 5 admin staff we serviced 765 exhibitors, which beat our 2014 record by 1.

In the 12 months leading into the 2016 event there were some major developments;

The re-introduction of the Equine Expo feature including the revamp of the Equine Arena.

Earthworks to remove the Ag Demo area and merge into Static Sites including power upgrades.

Extensive road works due to the heavy rains during February 2016.

Our sponsorship relations with the revitalised prospectus and benefits of being an Agfest Field Days Sponsor.

Our brand and marketing, the launch of our *Growing Rural Tasmania* theme, the creative design behind our new look, demonstrating that rural isn't restricted to life on farm, rural reaches out to each and every one of us whether it is means of work, lifestyle, interest or livelihood – we are all touched by the rural industry in some way of our life.

Our Rural Youth Clubs and Regions selling our Agfest tickets for fundraising, supporting Clubs and Regions to achieve their goals.

Roberts Ltd selling our tickets in their Town & Country stores state-wide and the establishment of the Rural Ag Scholarship for young Tasmanian's incurring costs to attend training or education in the rural sector to apply for funding to assist in their life goal. This was developed by Agfest and Roberts Ltd donating \$1 from every ticket sold at Roberts Town & Country stores forming the scholarship fund.



USA

Hi all,

So I am now four months in to my six month exchange to the United States of America, sponsored by Betta Milk. It has gone so fast and have enjoyed seeing lots of different places around America, I have been in 20 states to date.

I arrived in to South Dakota on the 19th of September and my first host meet me at the bus station and then we headed 45 minutes north of Sioux Falls to Colton where I would be based for three weeks. Heidi lives with her partner Mark and son Brody who is 10. Heidi works for Boadwine farms who own three farms milking 7,500 cows on three different animals sites, (2,180, 2000 & 3,400). Mark works at a John Deere store about an hour away and Brody attends the local school, and even on a day when I visited to give some talks found out that Liz and Mary Jo Ozman (2013 exchanges to Tasmania) went to school there at Tri-Valley.

As I have seen all the way though out America the cows are inside for a couple of reasons being that they have such extremes in weather with really hot summers and really really cold winters. (They have been telling me that our -7deg C mornings would feel like summer to them; their winters can be at a constant -30deg C). Being inside means that they can keep the temperature at an optimum temperate for the cow so they don't have to regulate their body temperature using energy that could be used to make milk.

The cows are milked three times a day on an eight hour roster for both cows and the people milking them. All of the farms have parallel systems milking 30 to 45 aside. When the cows walk in to the shed they are first touched to clean the teats to when the cow is cupped on it's 90 seconds (clean all then come back to the first to cup on from the start), one neighbouring shed even had timers there so everyone is working at the same speed. At the farm milking 2180 each shift they are filling a vat which is approximately 26,500L, so sending out over 556,500 litres of milk a week. There are some sheds about that don't even have a vat on site and they direct load on to the milk trailers and a new tanker is brought and swapped over, there is usually always three tankers sitting ready at the farm.

They are feed specific rations of feed depending on how many days in milk they are to ensure the maximum production, some pens are even feed three times a day as they are producing so much milk, other pens are feed twice a day and all feed is pushed up to the cows every few hours, so they are never hungry.

To lie down and rest the cows don't have to go very far, literally just turn around and there is a nice soft sand bed waiting for them, which is 'fluffed' up with an attachment on a bob cat while they are being milked.

Then there is the manure for all these cows! While the cows are being milked the lanes are scrapped out with the other bob cat and in to the underground system to then have the sand removed from the solids and then pumped in to the effluent pond. They need to have enough storage for 12 months worth of effluent as it is direct 'knifed' in to the ground in early autumn after all the crops are harvested.

I was able to visit a pig farm where they raise piglets from weaning at 13 weeks to six months at a wean to finish operation. 14 farmers in the area own all the sows at a separate facility and have one or two 1,200 pig barns where the piglets are delivered to them at 13 weeks. The farm I visited was the Greensways and Brad was since named Americas pig farmer of the year. He has so much knowledge and so sincere in the way he treats the pigs.

On the last few days with Heidi we travelled out to west South Dakota for a women in agriculture conference where she was a finalist for the South Dakotas women in agriculture award, sadly she didn't win, but we meet some amazing women from all over South Dakota! We took the chance to have a look about visiting Mt Rushmore, Crazy Horse and Devils Tower, for the three day trip we did about 1,600kms (1,000 miles).

USA

That ended my time with Heidi, Mark and Brody before heading to Sioux Falls for a few days to begin with my next host family.





He has helped out with AGFEST and been a Young Farmer judge, helps out at club level and hosts exchanges. "I'll help out until the phone stops ringing," says Nathan.

There is no doubt that Nathan is a great example of success in the Tasmanian agriculture industry. Rural Youth is proud to have been part of his journey.

What is Nathan's advice to all the Rural Youth members out there? "Be yourself, support each other and go out of your comfort zone because that's what Rural Youth is all about. Oh, and if you get the chance to go on an exchange or host a visitor, do it! It's great fun."


