He will head over to New Zealand and compete from 6-9 July at the FMG Young Farmer of the Year. As well as having a great opportunity to display his agriculture knowledge and skills, Marty will also be seeing the sites with a bit of touring and farm visits.

The idea of the 'Trans Tasman Challenge' all began when we received an email from our New Zealand counterparts asking if we thought it was a good idea... and of course we did! The competition adds a new and exciting element to our Young Farmer competition and is a chance for us to showcase the talent we have here in Tasmania.

Marty will be competing against Athol, a Mid Canterbury dairy farm manager. Athol works within the Senior Leadership Team at Purata Farms, supplying independent milk company Synlait Milk and leads a team of over ten staff.

The pull of the agriculture sector was too much for builder Marty, who after a downturn in the Launceston building industry started working with an agricultural contracting business and has never looked back. After competing in Young Farmer for 12 years and coming runner up 4 times, Marty's persistence paid off with his win in 2016.

Good luck to both contestants and here is hoping that Marty brings home the trophy!







William Craigie United Kingdom Exchange

My time in Northern Ireland was a very interesting time!

I flew from England to Belfast, by the time I landed I was feeling a little unwell.

Mitchell Park picked me up from the airport. Mitchell with his father and brother own a dairy farm in Ballymena. On Monday, we milked and fed cattle in the morning, cut silage throughout the day. That evening we bailed and carted the rounds back to the yard about 8km on the road. I brought my last load into the yard at 1am. The rest of the week consisted of farm jobs and site seeing, we went to Bush Mills Whisky Distillery for a tour and Carrick-a-Rede rope bridge near Ballintoy. Mitchell, his dad and myself climbed Slemish Mountain and drank Guinness beer, it was a very Irish thing to do! Thursday and Friday, we went to Balmoral show, it was like Agfest but with more activities. Things I saw were sheep and cattle judging, shearing competitions, tractor handling, tug of war, a beer tent and side show alley. That Saturday night we went to the Randelstown BBQ which was fun, it was held in a cattle shed with a band and a bar. This was followed by a quiet Sunday with burgers and chips.

On Monday Emma Miller (past exchange to Tas) picked me up and we spent the week together. We did lots of activities including Giant's Causeway, we did the full walk! Emma and I also went to Belfast to see the Titanic Museum and Belfast castle. Later that week, I went to work with John Cochrane. John is a chippy but works with concrete building now. I planted barley with a young farm member. We worked right on the coast in a 200hp John Deer with satellite guidance, this was very much over kill in the 15 acre fields. I also swam at Port Rush one morning which was extremely cold! Made Tassie feel tropical. Friday night was Sports night where 250 young farmers turned up to play soccer and tug of war. On Saturday night there was a BBQ, it was a good evening followed by a lazy Sunday.

On Sunday night, I met with Jack Johnston and his mates and we went to Port for a drink. I got put to work at the Johnston's farm where we milked 280 cows on a 20 aside swing over parlour. We also cut silage so Wednesday was all about hauling silage back from the fields in tractors and chaser bins. Ballymena show was on Friday afternoon. There was a young farmer competition that included hockey, tractor handling, ute course, quad bike challenge and tug of war. Saturday was a busy day, a young farmer member of Randalstown got married. When the wedding party leave the church, it is tradition to walk through an arch of pitch forks which I was asked to be in. We went back to the second day of the show for some more competitions and to have a better look around. Then back to the Johnston's to milk. I then caught the bus to another young farmer BBQ followed by a quiet Sunday morning and a lunchtime flight to Wales.

Meander Valley Council Community News

Working together for Westbury

A post flood review has resulted in a collaborative project along Quamby Brook. Meander Valley Council, along with a local landowner, are working together with TasWater and the Department of Primary Industries, Parks, Water and Environment (DPIPWE) to clear some of the willows on the floodplain between Meander Valley Road and the TasRail bridge.

"After the floods last year, it was identified that this area was particularly susceptible to inundation. Some of the willow trees had created a bottle neck, impeding the ow of water," Mayor Craig Perkins said. A select number of trees will be removed in order to reduce the risk of upstream inundation during extreme rain events. The project is an outstanding example of how collaborative effort and cooperation can lead to successful outcomes. The work is being funded by TasWater and the Crown with Council acting as the project's facilitator. DPIPWE will carry out ongoing maintenance of the area.

"Working together has enabled all stakeholders to access shared resources which directly benefits all involved and the community," Mayor Craig Perkins said. At the completion of the project the risk of inundation to sewerage networks will be reduced, safer areas will have been created to carry out test sampling and there will be greater accessibility to in-ground infrastructure. Residents are advised that the work will require the use of heavy machinery and there will be burning of vegetation on-site which will create smoke. Council appreciates the understanding of residents during this time. The work that commenced mid-May, is expected to be completed by early June.

Strategy released for public comment

Last month the Meander Valley Council Natural Resource Management Strategy was released for public comment. This document outlines the issues that our natural values face and how we work together with other organisations and the community to manage these challenges. Leading the way in regional growth

Meander Valley Council has received the 2017 National Award for Local Government. This award recognises Council's contribution to regional growth through the establishment, support and promotion of the Valley Central Industrial Precinct in Westbury. Driving investment and pursuing the development of the Valley Central precinct has resulted in direct community benefits while supporting economic outcomes beyond our municipality. With a total of \$327m of potential capital expenditure, the development is expected to create 1,713 jobs during construction and 202 ongoing permanent positions. "This is a great example of how public and private partnerships can work together to achieve great things," Mayor Craig Perkins said.

On the hunt for hidden treasures

The Jimmy Possum Exhibition was of officially launched at the Deloraine & Districts Folk Museum in May, coinciding with Heritage Week. Moving speeches on the night reminded us of the importance of preserving our unique local history.

The exhibition is the first step in ensuring that the hardships and triumphs of the past are remembered. Until recently, recounting stories about this mysterious chairmaker relied heavily upon the spoken word, which is precarious once memories fade. Volunteers at the Museum are making a concerted effort to ensure that stories about Jimmy Possum chairs and the man himself are not forgotten.

"In what could be described as a Jimmy Possum treasure hunt, no one really knows how many more chairs exist. Hidden away in old outbuildings, sheds and attics, once re-discovered, these chairs have incredible stories to tell. It is a privilege to have such tangible connections to our past," Museum volunteer, Roger Nutting, said.

Do you have a Jimmy Possum Chair or story to tell? Then the Deloraine & Districts Folk Museum would love to hear from you. Entrance to the Museum is via the Great Western Tiers Visitor Centre on Emu Bay Road, Deloraine.
