




Community Service Award section.



FREE TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT TRAINING DAY

Northern Midlands Council is providing training to members of local service and community groups who want to be able to run their own events in the road reserve.

This Traffic Management training allows volunteers to control traffic and has been successfully completed by groups who run events such as fun runs, parades, AGFEST, and the Tasmanian Craft Fair. Without this training, events will have to buy in specialist contractors costing up to \$1000 per day.

Council are willing to follow up this training with assistance in terms of signage and development of traffic plans.

EXECUTIVE OFFICER REPORT



In all parts of our lives we can apply the above title of this classic Clint Eastwood western movie from the 1960s. Part of my position is to look for what is not working well and this often highlights the bad & the ugly and it is easy to lose sight of the good. These are exciting times - Rural Youth Tasmania needs some adjustments but continues to have enormous opportunities and to ensure we keep focusing on our long term future, this month I would like to talk about some of the good.

Firstly, I would like to congratulate Simone and her team for their efforts in putting together last Sunday's AGM at Fonthill, Oatlands. There were many telephone calls and some difficult moments trying to get enough members, from the right clubs, for quorum but this was achieved with some late arrivals. Quorum issues are an indicator of lack of membership engagement with the organisation. We already know this and have plans in place to visit each club to discuss the issues and assist them to build strong resilient clubs with close organisational and community connections.

Congratulations to all members and clubs who won awards and a big thank you for the other members who turned up for a good, fun meeting – I loved the video from Westmorland club and their prize for this competition has now been changed to singing lessons. The Annual Report is a credit to Tracey Badcock, disappointing that not many clubs chose to submit reports but will still be a good memento of 2013. With a State President (Simone Hayers) from Southern Region, Senior Vice President (Prue Dennis) from Northern Region and Junior Vice President (Tiffany Morley) from the North West Region let's be parochial - bring on the competitions!!

My partner, Michael and I judged the 2013 Outstanding New Member Award and this was a great opportunity to meet some of the newer members. We were very impressed with the quality of these members and the winner Tiffany Morley (Sisters Creek) then stepped up to become junior VP. Well done Tiffany and also to Dale Hayers who won the Outstanding Member Award.

2013 was another good financial year with Rural Youth Tasmania's balance sheet continuing to improve. Johnson Breward Brown have audited our finances for many years and it was decided to request tenders for this work, in February. This has resulted in the AGM members appointing Synectic Audit & Assurance Pty Ltd as the current auditors.

Change is in the wind - the AGM members have voted to explore a restructure of our organisation. "Pessimists complain about the wind, Optimists expect the wind to change, Realists adjust the sails" William Arthur Ward. While we are 'adjusting the Rural Youth sails' it will be business as usual as we conduct regional one day workshops for current and advisory members to

discuss more specific details. From the workshops new Constitution and Committee charters with transitional arrangements will be drafted and circulated for comment. Voting members will then be invited to a Special General Meeting to vote on the new Organisational Structure and Constitution. If passed, we will move into the new structure with timeframes set for reviews to assess what is/is not working in the new structure.

We are continuing to work on rebranding and you will start to see consistent messages coming through. The AGM members were presented with some new logo options which we are still tweaking, with the hope to unveil the new look at Agfest. The selected slogan is:

Rural Youth Tasmania - a launch pad for life

It has also been decided to lift the profile of Rural Youth at Agfest. The small function centre meeting room will be used as the Rural Youth Members base which will allow office/desk space for the State President, Agfest Chair, Executive Officer, Promotions and Safety Officer. This room will also be used for meetings, special guests and media interviews. There will be availability for members to leave their parcels, wet weather gear etc. The office staff will still be situated in the site office but this will be exhibitor manager and staff only. We will have desks, computers, photocopiers and stationery at the member's office to alleviate some of the site office congestion.

With the politicians in election mode I took the opportunity in the past month to spend some time highlighting Rural Youth Tasmania to them. Jeremy Rockliff has been a long time supporter of Rural Youth Tasmania and last week announced an election promise of \$40,000 (over four years). Therefore, it is my view that this money could be used to assist developing clubs with community based projects but we need to wait until we see what the fine print states.

Yes, though some might dispute this statement, this is definitely on the good list © © Amanda and her very capable team are on the wind up, working bees are on the go again to get the site ready. If you are wanting to volunteer at Agfest please ensure you have completed a 2014 Volunteer Form and returned to the office.

Administration – At this time of the year Agfest takes a significant amount of the administration hours. Selena has also been working on continuing to work with Sharepoint – this is quite a large job to get all the members, folders and documents (with permission access) setup.

Finance – Linda is working with the Agfest exhibitor payments. She has been very diligent in chasing outstanding invoices and she now has most of this money 'stacked' in the bank awaiting the deluge of Agfest payments.

Tassie farmers to benefit with subsidised farm business training

Rural Business Tasmania, in partnership with Rural Biz Training has announced an exciting offer of on farm accredited training for farmers. With local support and flexible on line learning opportunities this unique program is now available in Tasmania.

Rural Business Chief Executive, Elizabeth Skirving, explained that a participant would be able to gain an Advanced Diploma of Agriculture (or Agribusiness Management) under the subsidised funding. Skill sets at different levels are also offered.

RuralBiz Training is a nationally registered training organisation that has received funding and accreditation to offer the business skill sets useful in running proactive farming business enterprises. Participants can choose to do one, many or all of the skill sets.

The training will be offered via an initial face to face half day workshop, followed by online training which can be done without leaving the farm. Virtual classrooms, where students interact in real time with their trainers, is teamed with an online learning management system giving 24/7 access to learning resources. In addition, Rural Business Tasmania is providing local mentoring to supplement normal student support services. This partnership will combine the best of face to face and online training to help students reach their desired qualification sooner.

The training is part funded from the Tasmanian Government "Tasmanian Skills Fund" to offer significant reductions in training costs.

The funding requires students to make a contribution (upfront or via Vet Fee-Help), but completion bonuses will be offered as recognition of the commitment made by busy farmers to complete their enrolments. The net effect is low cost, nationally accredited training.

Commonwealth student assistance VET FEE-HELP is also available which would make it possible for students to complete many units without any upfront payment – and still gain a full qualification.

For information please phone 1300 88 FARM for an Expression of Interest/application form. Rural Financial counsellors can also assist in referring you to this training opportunity.

Information sessions will be held in Hobart (18th March), Launceston (19th March) and Ulverstone (20th March from 10am, followed in the afternoon by half day face to face workshops for those enrolling. Training will be scheduled from April 2014.

Prue Dennis – Winner 2013 Study Tour Self-Nominated Study Tour Report

In 2013, I was most fortunate to be awarded the prize of being selected for the prize of self-nominated study tour, by which I received \$500 to put towards a course of my own interest. With this riding on the back of also receiving the most outstanding member award for 2012, I put all my money together and set off on an adventure sure to change my life. I chose to put my money towards funding a trip to Quirindi in NSW to attend a saddle making school. Something I had always wanted to undertake and was high priority on my 'bucket list', I made it my mission to do this course and become the first person in Tasmania to participate in this one in particular.

In late November, I set off. Boarded a plane in Launceston, set for Tamworth NSW, Via Melbourne then onto Sydney. Excitement really hit when I got on the small Qantas propeller plane bound for Tamworth, but excitement soon disappeared when we hit massive turbulence and a thunderstorm just out of Sydney. Travel sickness on a plane that size is most undesirable!! So the plane landed and I was dam happy about that! Was at an airport smaller, yes that's right, smaller then Launceston.

I collected my bag and that was where the next week, an awesome exciting week would start. So Greg picked me up, packed me in the car and we set off to Bunnings, I fitted right in and felt immediately like the family, I taught him a few things about hardware and about sharpening rouge's.

When we hit the road we headed for Quirindi, a further hour down the road. There was thunder and lightning and heaps of rain, then hail and some more rain. Blissful weather. Once we got to Quirindi late Saturday afternoon, the formalities began. We got talking so he could understand some more about me, where I was from, what sort of riding I did and how I wanted to build my saddle. He asked me to start doing some drawings so he would envisage what I wanted to build. Little did he know I was the most ridiculously organised person in the world and had already drawn exactly what I wanted. He gave credit to my keen-ness and my preparedness.

On the Saturday afternoon we looked at the tree, and sat, and looked, and sat and looked some more. We put on some proxy stirrup leathers to establish what length my fenders needed to be. This was when it started to sink in that this was happening, it was really really happening.

After a long, stressful day flying, I called it quits for the night and hit the hay ready to start on my saddle the next day. So Sunday morning came, I woke early and was flinging up the shed roller door at around 6.30. My keenness was duly noted and I got told that if I wished to start so early I needed to come bearing gifts, mainly that of brown milky warmness that is coffee, and that my friends is where it began.

I can't tell you the exact specifics of how the seat was built in my saddle, as I won't give away all the secrets. It's an eye opener but it all made perfect sense when Greg explained it all. On the Sunday morning, we unrolled my leather side to inspect it. It was gorgeous. Simply beautiful. There are no words used to explain how a side of beautiful, rich chestnut coloured Herman Oak leather looks, let alone feels. For those that don't know, Herman oak is a thick, tough leather to cut. It is hard wearing and ages beautifully. Herman oak leather is generally from the sides of beasts in cool to cold climates, very similar to Tasmania. This leather is so much thicker and stronger because it needs to handle to cooler harsher climates.

Once we had inspected the leather, the planning of the positioning of the templates of the pieces in which were to be cut from the side began, the fenders had to be made from identical leather of the same thickness with no marks. Everything had to be thought about logically. Once this was done, I covered my knee rolls. A template was made and the stitching was done. It consisted of a two handed stitch with one continuous piece of string with a needle at either end. Once this was done, the basis of a saddle was starting to take place.

Over the duration of the next few days, the saddle quickly took place. The skirt was cut and stitched and hardware was added. The seat was shaped and moulded and the cantle cover was created. Everything was beginning to take shape. FINALLY!! On the Thursday, I had a quiet day. Greg had to take his son in for his P's driving text, so his daughter and I went for a drive to check out the beautiful scenery. We headed out to the New England Highway and went for a drive in her Subaru Brumby. It was a beautiful day with whips of

wind, and just the right amount of warmth. Thursday afternoon, we got back into it. We fitted the skirts on and got the seat glued on. EXCTIEMENT EXCITEMENT!! MY SADDLE WAS ALMOST DONE!! Friday morning it was on! All that was left was to stitch the seat, screw on the Conchos and get it ready for photos. That was soon done and in less time than Greg thought. My saddle was made. I was so chuffed. I polished it and brushed the seat getting it ready for a photo. The photos were taken and I couldn't have been happier. There was blood, sweat and a lot of tears that went into the saddle. There were tantrums and moments when I doubted everything that I was doing, but I did it. I finally did it!


I had finished a day early and had Saturday to kill. So the offer was laid on the table to go droving out on the stock routes with Greg's daughter, Kristen. I jumped at the opportunity to do something that was never done in Tasmania. There Kristen and I handled 500 head of Black Angus cattle up and down this stretch of road. Road trains and all roaring past. Some slowed right down and were really respectful of the horses and cattle, but others would drive straight through the mob, blowing the horn and all. Sometimes heading the mod off meant galloping up the highway, fun adrenaline pumping stuff. I was living the dream and riding in a saddle that I had just finished making the day before. I was so proud of myself. So we got sunburnt, put up with horrible black flies and smelt of horse sweat. But I had lived an experience that I would never have a chance to do again and I loved every minute of it.

We got back untacked the horses, cleaned up and headed to the pub for my last night in Quirindi. The Terminus was holding their annual beach party and it was time to let our hair down. Saturday night turned into Sunday morning, we headed to bed ready for an early start so Kristen could go back droving and I could go to the airport to start my journey home. This consisted of packing my back, including my saddle into my big Wrangler bag. I got it in and weighed it, once, twice, three times. It was so boarder line on my luggage allowance of 20kg I was pushing my luck. When I got to Tamworth airport and put my bag on the scales it weighed EXACTLY 20kg, not 20.1 or 19.9 but 20kg, perfection!! I was stoked!! Now I could board the plane and head home, my journey was over. I had the time of my life and had learned something so wonderful and had a stunning saddle to show from this. I simply cannot fathom how much I enjoyed this course and how much I encourage people to do it. I will most likely go back and do it again in another 5 or 6 years I enjoyed it that much.

I thank Rural Youth for helping financially with this opportunity. It has given me a gift to last a lifetime.




